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FOREWORD

I am happy to present the Annual Report of the University for the year 2019-20. Bengaluru City University has been established on 13th August 2015 by promulgating an amendment to the Karnataka State Universities Act 2000. Though the Act was amended in August 2015, implementation has been effected by the appointment of the Vice-Chancellor on 26-07-2017. As such, the University has completed 3 years and 8 months with the completion of the year 2019-20. The name of the University has been subsequently changed to “**Bengaluru City University**” with effect from 19th June 2020 by the issuance of an Ordinance. This change of name depicts the actual demography of the University. The University's jurisdiction comprises 13 Assembly Constituencies of Bengaluru City, namely, Shanthinagar, Byatarayanapura, Yelahanka, Malleshwaram, Hebbal, Shivajinagar, Gandhinagar, Chamarajpet, Chickpet, Basavangudi, BTM Layout, Jayanagar and Rajajinagar. The University has 235 affiliated colleges comprising 09- Government Colleges, 02 - BBMP Colleges, 29 - Private aided colleges, 183 - Private unaided colleges, 23 B.Ed. Colleges, 01- B.P.Ed., College and 8 - Autonomous Colleges. Govt. V.H.D. Central Institute of Home Science, Government Science College, Maharani's Arts, Commerce & Management College, and Maharani's Science College, have ceded with us and become part of Cluster University and Nrupatunga University.

I. Sanction of Teaching and Non-Teaching Posts:

The Government of Karnataka has sanctioned 123 non-teaching posts and 124 new teaching posts, making it 161 teaching posts including the 37 teaching posts transferred from Bangalore University. With the sanction of recent teaching posts, the UGC prescribed 1:2:4 ratios concerning Professor, Associate Professor and Assistant Professor are met. Though the Government sanctioned new posts and permitted them to fill up a portion of them, the Covid-19 related issues have affected the State economy;

as a result, the Government has stalled the recruitment process. This has adversely affected the teaching and research for which the University is supposed to stand. Hopefully, in the coming year, the Government may permit for recruitment of teaching and non-teaching posts. In view of competition posed by the Private Universities, the survival of any Public University depends on acquiring qualified and competent teaching faculty and better infrastructure. Unfortunately, this new University could not make expected progress in this direction. The University may have to continue hiring Guest Faculty to supplement the existing teachers and take up the entire teaching work of the new Post Graduate Departments.

The present teaching faculty are striving hard to meet the academic deadlines, and they don't have time to concentrate on any add-on responsibility. I am proud to record that, with all the adversities, the teachers of the University have been doing their best in their respective areas.

II. Academic and Examination Activity:

- a) Three new Post Graduate Departments, namely, Physics, Life Science (Plant Science), Life Science (Animal Science), have been added during the year, making 18 P.G. Departments. I am happy to mention that Karnataka Government has given its approval for starting five more Post Graduate Departments in the frontier areas such as Environment and Climate Change, Technology, Urban Studies and Planning, Arts and Aesthetics and Law and Public Policy. Thus, 15 new P.G. Departments are added in the last two years, increasing from 8 to 23. Due to the outbreak of Covid-19, further progress could not be made to implement these courses from the next academic year.
- b) The University with the available human resources has successfully completed the affiliation, admissions of Under Graduate and Post Graduate courses for the

year 2019-20. The examinations are conducted as per schedule, and results are declared in time. The use of automation has helped in a big way and eased out all the examination related activities. This could happen with the co-operation of students, teachers, Principals and staff, the University has successfully conducted the examinations during the year with the dismal number of supporting staff.

III. Infrastructure

- a) The available buildings on the campus need renovation, and some buildings may have to be demolished. The University is in the process of preparing a master plan for the Campus. Tenders inviting expressions of Interest have been floated. Since the University does not have an independent Engineering Division, the Syndicate of the University has decided to request the Government to take up the construction, renovation, and landscaping works at the cost of Rs.150 crores. Necessary blue prints needed will be prepared and the works will be taken up with due approval of the University Authorities.

In addition to the renovation and repairs to the existing buildings, the University has to provide the basic facilities on the campus such as Administrative building, Faculty Buildings, Students Hostels, Guest House, Health Centre, Cafeteria, Sports Facilities like gymnasium, indoor- stadium, play grounds and connectivity to Central College Campus and Prasanna Kumar Block are to be taken up. The University has requested the Government of Karnataka to allot 50 acres of land within the jurisdiction of the University to establish an extension center for providing better infrastructure for new courses.

To reduce the financial burden on electricity consumption and to fall in line with the Government's initiative of renewable energy sources, the University has taken action to

install Solar Power System on the available roof-tops. For better connectivity, Internet, Wi-Fi and CCTV surveillance systems must be installed across the campus.

SC/ST/OBC Welfare Measures:

All the welfare programmes for SC/STs, Minorities and OBC students available in the Social Welfare Department, Tribal Welfare Department, Backward and Minorities Departments have been extended to the students of the University. A dedicated section under a Special Officer has been entrusted with the responsibility for timely action. The University has also made efforts to introduce welfare programmes for SC/ST students under SCP-TSP grants sanctioned by the Government.

Library:

The Library Building also needs renovation and repair. The Library needs to be modernised and upgraded. The library has a total collection of 29,000 books and access to databases from the UGC Infonet. Anti-plagiarism software through Shodh Ganga Project has been introduced. The Library is managed by Dr. Anjanappa, retired Librarian of Bangalore University and two supporting staff.

Prasaranga

The Prasaranga has a vital role to play in the university system. The extension activities, printing of different textbooks, publication of Research Journals, the printing of the contemporary books and translation /reference books for the use of the Kannada medium students who write examinations in Kannada medium are to be taken up by the Prasaranga. We may have to either appoint an honorary Co-ordinator with the relevant experience or designate a faculty member to be incharge of the Prasaranga.

NSS Activities

Sri Govinde Gowda, Associate Professor of Mount Carmel College (Autonomous), works as an NSS Co-ordinator on an honorary basis. Various activities as per the State/Central Government guidelines are being carried out in addition for helping the University administration to organise different programmes/National important days& celebrations.

Physical Education & Sports:

Bengaluru City University has been providing necessary facilities for the promotion of Sports. The Sports persons of the University have been encouraged to participate in the various events conducted by the Universities across the country. I am happy to record that the Hockey-Men team of the University has won the National Championship in Khelo India Tournament performed at Bhubaneswar–Orissa. Dr.C.N Ashwathanarayan, Deputy Chief Minister and Pro-Chancellor of the University, honoured the team and announced a cash prize of Rs.25,000 to each player and the officers of the team. The University has also adopted the cash incentive scheme of Bangalore University for cash award for winning team at South Zone, All India and International Level. Mr. Mohammed Ilias, retired Director of Physical Education of an affiliated college, is looking after Physical Education activities. Regular inter-collegiate athletic meets are organised.

Covid-19 Pandemic:

The Covid-19 Pandemic has affected the life world over. The lockdown declared by the Government of India has compelled the University to postpone all the academic and examination activities. The University is obliged to follow the guidelines issued by the University Grant Commission/Ministry of Human Resource Development and the Government of Karnataka. As per the instructions, the University has to conduct examinations for final year students only. The results of intermediate semester students are to be declared based on their internal marks and performance in the previous

semester examinations. A detailed advisory has been issued in this regard. The academic year 2020-21 is also in the doldrums, and uncertainty prevails.

This University has all the potential to grow as a center of excellence in the coming years. The competition of Private Universities and autonomous colleges is to be transformed as an opportunity to excel. The University needs to have a more significant academic and administrative autonomy. To professionally manage the affairs, talented and efficient teaching faculty are to be hired, the wisdom of experienced retired professors to be used as an adjunct, honorary professors to supplement the teaching activities. Vacant posts are to be filled up on a regular basis, state of the art infrastructure is to be provided to realise the cherished dreams of higher education.

The campus is to be made a place where the academic and research environment prevails. In this direction, the campus is to be face-lifted, and an ambience is to be created with much flora and fauna and by creating a campus life where the teaching, learning and research are to remain as the paramount factor.

The Arts Faculty Departments of the University do not have regular teaching staff and faculty in Science & Commerce are inadequate. Efforts will motivate the faculty and research scholars to take up the Bengaluru specific socially relevant research topics. The civic agencies, such as BBMP, BDA, METRO, KSRTC, BDA, KUWSSB, Indian Railways, Corporate Houses and other agencies will be approached to associate socially relevant projects concerned with the respective agencies. Bengaluru centric urban issues are diversified and need the involvement of multiple P.G departments. Hence efforts are to be made by the IQAC and PMEBA Boards for better coordination. The proposed PG Departments like Environment and Ecology, Urban Studies & Planning, Technology Law & Public Policy could lead to an interdisciplinary research approach. The existing Commerce, Chemistry, Bio-chemistry, Management, Departments could consider ‘Science & Society’ approach for devising the research topics.

The following research areas are socially relevant to the Bengaluru City University and promote interdisciplinary research works. The research works envisage to carry out research of international standard on some of the frontier areas mentioned

below considering the urban and social needs of the Bengaluru City in particular state and nation at large.

Local culture and scope for cultural exchange: Bangalore has a healthy mix of all religions and cosmopolitan cultures. Bengaluru has become the preferred place for people from different regions of Karnataka, India and abroad. The diversified culture, language, literature and art will provide scope for study and research. The proposed PG Department of Art & Aesthetics could co-ordinate the multidisciplinary research. and provide a platform for cultural exchange programmes with different International Universities.

Community studies: Bengaluru City has a distinction of healthy community life. Different communities with their cultural practices and their analysis are fertile areas for research. For instance, North eastern community, Gujarati, Marwadi Sindhi, Punjabi, Bengali, Nepali, Kashmiri, Marathi, Telugu, Tamil, Malayali community etc., in addition, there is also international population. The community studies offer scope for more excellent collaborative global research. The frontier areas of research works in science and technology include geographical concerns, societal needs and other logistics.

Promotion of excellence in higher education:

Orientation, invited lectures are organized to motivate the young students

Guest faculties have been appointed to various departments.

Initiatives are taken to promote the overall development of the University:

The University has started new PG courses in accordance with changing trends in higher education.

The University also has started evening certificate/diploma/advanced diploma courses under the Center for Global Languages

The old Physics Block Building has been renovated to house the PG Depts., of Arts Faculty.

Similarly, the Old Correspondance Course Building and a portion of the Natural Science Block have been repaired to accommodate the new PG Departments.

Welfare measures for SC/ST/OBC/Women/Divyang and others:

SC/ST/OBC students are encouraged to apply for the financial assistance scheme of the Social Welfare Dept., The students of other backward classes and minority communities are enabled to get the assistance extended by the Backward Class & Minorities Depts. A separate unit under a Special Officer having experience in the Social Welfare Department is looking after the matters relating to Scholarships meant for such students.

Promotion of Kannada in all its celebrated forms:

The Kannada language is used as an administrative language

The Proceedings of Syndicate, Academic Council and other committees are drafted in Kannada.

Academic Council has decided to prescribe Kannada as a language for the First four semesters of Under Graduate Courses.

Since many students under Arts Faculty write examinations in Kannada medium, an effort is also made to teach in Kannada.

Initiatives to mobilize finances through PPP, alumni/alumnae associations etc.,

An effort will be made to establish the Alumnae Association. Initiatives will be taken to mobilize finances through the PPP model

Innovative measures to ensure announcement of results before commencement of following semesters of UG and PG degree courses:

With a limited number of employees, the examination section is continuously progressing by adapting the available latest technology and best practices. Some of the innovative measures are as follows.

Student data is directly imported from the Online Admission Data.

Exam Registration and the IA marks entry is being done online.

All pre and post examination activities are automated.

Examination Admit Cards are issued directly through online.

Automated coding of answer scripts of all the courses is done, which will reduce the mistakes and save time.

The marks are entered by valuer/examiners; as a result, wastage and errors are minimized.

Examinations are conducted as per the calendar of events, and results are announced well within 30 days from the last examination date.

Student representation in Academic Council (section 30 of KSU Act, 2000)

The University will make efforts to nominate the students on Academic Council. Necessary Statutes are being drafted for the nomination of students.

4. Organization and Administration:

Procedures to address Intra and Inter-campus administration:

Technology is being used for day to day administration and monitoring

Regular meetings with Chairpersons, Officers and Principals

Visit to departments and colleges on a need basis

Entrusting responsibilities to the Heads of the Department to work as an interface to the administration for smooth functioning of the departments

Follow-up activities monitored through discussion on action taken report in the apex body administration such as Syndicate and Academic Council

Measures to address vacancies in administrative/technical/support staff:

The Government of Karnataka has sanctioned teaching and non-teaching posts required for 23 Post Graduate Departments of the University at the rate of 1 Professor, 2 Associate Professors and 4 Assistant Professors for each department. The Government has also been permitted to fill up 59 teaching posts.

Measures have been taken to seek approval for reservation and the Hyderabad Karnataka region. Once the Government lifts the restriction imposed, the details will be sent to KEA as per the Higher Education Department orders.

Guest faculty and temporary non-teaching staff were appointed on a need basis for the smooth functioning of the University in terms of both teaching and non-teaching.

Campus Security (Main and other campuses):

24x7 security services have been provided by deploying Home Guards for security management of the campuses.

Welfare measures for non-teaching and teaching staff:

University encourages faculty members to attend and participate in workshops, seminars, conferences and symposia. The University constantly encourages and motivates faculty members to apply for funded research projects offered by different funding agencies and made provisions in the Annual Budget to provide financial assistance. Inter disciplinary and cross-disciplinary research will also be promoted by providing necessary financial services. Study leave will be granted for one year to do Post-Doctoral research abroad through the fellowship. The qualified non-teaching staff are also encouraged by giving promotions to the next cadre. It is planned to organize a training programme on office procedure and awareness of rules and regulations, KSU Act, Statutes, Ordinances, examination manual etc.

The green atmosphere of the campus is being used for morning walkers. A playground, a small canteen are present. The University provides potable drinking water facility.

The proposal for providing better internet facility with sufficient speed is being taken up. Each department has been offered an independent internet facility for research, academics, and administrative use.

The University is appointing a coordinator and establishing the IQAC for performance evaluation, assessment, accreditation, and quality up-gradation of higher education institutions. **a. Credit Accumulation and Transfer System after implementation of Choice Based Credit System (CBCS): Admission to International students and students from other states who have not studied under CBCS; lateral entry and admission of diploma students to UG degree course
CBCS Implementation at PG Level:**

The Bengaluru City University has adopted the CBCS-Semester Scheme Regulations of Bangalore University regarding Under Graduate Courses. The CBCS-Semester Scheme P.G. Regulations of Bangalore University have been adopted with some minor changes. The draft regulations are submitted to the Government for seeking assent of His Excellency the Chancellor. These Regulations are in line with the regulations/directives/guidelines issued by the University Grants Commission, New

Delhi, regarding the implementation of Choice Based Credit System (CBCS, Semester Scheme) in both the under-graduate and post-graduate programmes and also the advisories of the Higher Education Council, Government of Karnataka, The Choice Based Credit System enables the degrees of Bengaluru City University to be on par with the global standards so that the acceptability of the programmes and degrees offered by the University becomes comparable and readily acceptable. In view of the New Education Policy-2020 introduced by the Government of India, the University may have to redraft the regulations in the coming years.

The Salient Features of the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) (Semester Scheme):

Each course in a programme shall carry a certain number of credits, which generally represent the weightage of a course and are a function of teaching, learning and evaluation strategies such as a number of contact hours, the course content, teaching methodology, learning expectations, etc. In the proposed programmes, the credits shall be based on the number of instructional hours per week; generally, 1 credit is equivalent to one hour of instruction in theory, or 1 or 2 hours of tutorial, or one and a half or two hours of practical/field work /project work/internship per week.

The other features of the CBCS (Semester Scheme) are:

- The P. G. degree programmes are structured on a credit-based semester scheme.
- The relative importance of subjects of study and activities are quantified in terms of credits. The total credit of the programme is generally between 80 to 100.
- Each programme of study will have “Core” and “Elective” courses. The Core course will further consist of “Hard” and “Soft” core courses.
- The open elective will be chosen from other programmes within the faculty or across the faculty.
- The declaration of result is based on the grade point average (GPA) earned towards the end of each semester and the Cumulative Grade Point.

— Average (CGPA) earned towards the end of the programme with corresponding alpha–sign grade.

12. Student support:

BENGALURU CITY UNIVERSITY

STATUTES GOVERNING THE INSTITUTION OF ENDOWMENTS FOR AWARD OF GOLD MEDALS, PRIZES, FELLOWSHIPS, SCHOLARSHIPS ENDOWMENT LECTURES AND ACADEMIC CHAIRS THE BENGALURU CITY UNIVERSITY, 2020.

(Framed under Section 40(1) (h) of the Karnataka State Universities Act, 2000)

In exercise of the powers conferred by Section 41(1) read with Section 40 (1) (h) of the Karnataka State Universities Act, 2000, the Syndicate of the Bengaluru City University, do hereby makes the following Statutes, namely,-

1. Title and Commencement.- (1) These Statutes shall be called “**STATUTES GOVERNING THE INSTITUTION OF ENDOWMENTS FOR AWARD OF GOLD MEDALS, PRIZES, FELLOWSHIPS, SCHOLARSHIPS ENDOWMENT LECTURES AND ACADEMIC CHAIRS IN THE BENGALURU CITY UNIVERSITY, 2020.**”

(2) They shall come into force from the date of assent of His Excellency the Chancellor.

2. Definitions.- In these Statutes, unless the context otherwise requires, the words and expressions used herein shall have the

same meaning as assigned to them in the Karnataka State Universities Act, 2000.

- 3. Institution of Endowments.-** (1) No endowments will be instituted without being accepted by the Syndicate;
- (2) A proposal for the institution of endowments for award of gold medals, prizes, fellowships, scholarships, endowment lectures and Academic Chairs by an individual or an institution shall be made to the Registrar in writing, along with a demand draft in favour of the Finance Officer, Bengaluru City University, and terms of award as proposed by the donor.
- (3) The proposal so received shall be placed before the Academic Council and the Syndicate, along with the opinion of the Academic Council, if any, for approval.
- (4) The University shall accept an endowment for the establishment of fellowships, scholarships, prizes, gold medals, Academic Chairs and other merit awards for the degree, or diploma or certificate course or in any specific paper of the course of this University.
- (5) The University shall not accept an endowment for the institution of fellowships, scholarships, prizes, gold medals and other merit awards based on the caste, creed, community religion and region.
- (6) No Gold Medal shall be accepted for Ph.D unless it is instituted for a particular specialization.
- (7) The University shall not accept an endowment whose corpus is less than the amount mentioned against the purpose of endowment, as indicated below:

	Minimum Amount*	Rs.
1.	For Cash prize	4.00 lakhs
2.	For Gold Medal	6.00 lakhs
3.	For Scholarship	15.00 lakhs
4.	For Endowments Lectures series	10.00 lakhs

5.	For Institution of Academic Chair	2.0crores
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- (8) The Syndicate may, in consultation with the appropriate authorities of the Bengaluru City University, institute gold medals, prizes, fellowships, scholarships, studentships, travelling fellowships, stipends, endowment lectures out of its funds.
- (9) All offers of bequests, donations and endowments, the management of which is vested in the University.
- (10) On accepting the proposal, the Donor shall enter into an agreement duly registered with the University.
- (11) For the management of endowment corpus, the University shall deduct 10% of the annual income therefrom and credit the same to the general fund of the University at the commencement of every financial year.
- (12) Where the amount of interest accruing on the corpus is not sufficient to obtain Gold Medal made, the University shall have the discretion to award a cash prize in lieu of the Gold Medal. However, before awarding such a cash prize, the University shall request the Donor, wherever possible, as to whether he/she is willing to donate an additional amount to enable the University to supplement the corpus for which Gold Medal is instituted.
- (13) The Syndicate shall have the power to enhance the minimum amount for an institution of any gold medals, prizes, fellowships, scholarships, endowment lectures etc., depending on the circumstances.

46. Vice Chancellor's Views

The infrastructure, financial and human resources play a vital role in the early stages of establishment. The conditions of the available buildings are precariously bad. The University has started 3 new departments during 2019-20, and Government has approved five more departments. Post-graduate admissions, an affiliation of colleges, admission approval of UG courses, and simultaneously starting the examination activities have been successfully made for the second year. However, the Covid-19 Pandemic has stalled academic activities. The examinations supposed to be conducted during Mar/Apr, 2020 could not be undertaken, and 2020-21 are also kept on hold. With the help of teaching faculty, officers, experienced retired employees, the young employees, the University could accomplish the tasks successfully.

In the coming years, the University plans to start the PG Departments sanctioned by the Government of Karnataka in the Arts, Science and Law Faculties. The University is making steady progress in teaching and research and slowly surging ahead with the vision of inclusive and sustainable development. Further initiatives are required to automate the governance procedures, internet facilities, CCTV surveillance, and transparency in the administration.

The curriculum of subjects in the Arts Faculty is revised and updated with the global standards beginning with the first batch of the Students. The faculty of Science and Commerce and the Curriculum of the courses have also been revised, incorporating recent global trends and developments. The Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) offers choice and flexibility in learning. Research has gained impetus during the year 2019-20 due to the admissions made to Ph.D course.

The University also has take-up development works and beautification of the campus. The University aims to build an eco-friendly campus and has taken some steps towards this by conducting Swachhata Abhiyan and thereby trying to make the campus a plastic free campus.

To sum up, the University has been working towards providing the best to all its stakeholders within the limitations and restraints. The ultimate aim is to build a socially conscious, responsible, optimistic, and educated young generation that can

contribute to the nation's growth. With our conscious and committed efforts, we are striving to achieve excellence with inclusiveness and sustainability.
